The college also participated in India Today Ranking 2024, and secured 28th rank in B.A. category.
Facilitating Timely Career Advancement for Faculty under CAS	Provided a continuous support system to college administration by initial screening and verification of APARs and PBAS of the faculty members to facilitate their timely promotions.
Multidisciplinary research training for students	The Centre for Research offers a variety of programmes to train students in multidisciplinary and interdisciplinary research. These programmes include Summer Internship Programme (SIP), Annual Research Programme (ARP), and Vocal for Local (VFL). Under SIP, a total of 28 research projects were carried out, 15 projects under ARP and 3 projects under VFL were approved and undertaken by students. The college offered 50 Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and 20 Value Added Courses (VAC) under NEP 2020 UGCF-curriculum to strengthen the skill sets and

	develop additional values of students.

Capacity building of the faculty and students	The outcome of research projects carried out under CFR are published in reputed national and international journals, and are also presented in various conferences and symposia by students and faculty. 12 Ph.D. students were registered under 8 faculty members during 2023-24.
Empowering Women Through Entrepreneurship, Innovation, and Skill Development for a Thriving Start-Up Culture	The college promotes self-reliance through organisation of start-up bazars on every Wednesday and during various festivals organised in the college premises. Students and alumni of the college could sell products being made by them, thereby providing them with an

	<p>opportunity to understand market, customer behaviour, and build up strategies to market their products. Tuck shop is being managed by the alumnae and her mother to provide healthy food options to our students such as freshly cut fruits, millet-rich food. At present, five in-house initiatives (Gulistan, Kasturi herbals, Kriti, Chatraka and Nutribiome), and 23 student startups are active. The Skill Centre of the college, Atharvan, received seed funding of INR 8 Lakhs from University of Delhi to support skill based courses on the campus.</p>
Raising awareness, and promoting gender sensitization	<p>The Internal Committee of Maitreyi College organized lectures aimed at raising awareness among our students and employees about the Vishakha guidelines, POSH act, and the legal position in India regarding sexual harassment of women at the workplace. Health and hygiene committee organised a workshop on 'Gender Bone Nutrition and Exercise' that provided valuable insights and knowledge to the attendees, empowering them with practical skills and information. These issues are also embedded in the UGCF curriculum. The girl's hostel in the college premises provides a safe, supportive and empowering environment for female students. It hosts 102 students. 70 CCTV cameras have been installed at key locations to ensure added safety.</p>

<p>Inclusivity and Accessibility</p>	<p>The Enabling Unit of our college has recorded more than 50 books/chapters/study materials for Print-Disabled individuals. This e-content is freely accessible to those in need, regardless of location. Enabling Unit also provides writer facilities to PwD candidates for the UGC-NET Examination at the Maitreyi College Centre. The college has implemented various measures to enhance accessibility on campus, ensuring a more inclusive and welcoming environment for all stakeholders such as Google mapping and QR coding of all classrooms, and other rooms of the college. The college also created a onepoint solution app for all information about the college designed by the alumni, students and faculty- the Uniway App. As Sugamya Bharat Abhiyan, Sugmaya Maitreyi is a part of the Uniway app. The students of Maitreyi College part of the core organising committee in the Divya Utsav, the first-of-its-kind festival organised in Delhi for the disabled by the Delhi Disability Commissioner, and the Purple Fest, a National level festival for the Disabled organised by the Ministry of Social Justice and hosted in the Rashtrapati Bhavan. They made the festival accessible through QR code generation. They also created an app called Iwayto help disabled visitors navigate the festival smoothly.</p>

15. Multidisciplinary / interdisciplinary	
<p>Following the National Education Policy (NEP) 2020, Maitreyi College is committed to an interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary approach across all its initiatives. As a constituent college of the University of Delhi, it offers Generic Elective courses, Value Addition Courses (VAC) and Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), and compulsory courses such as Environmental Studies (EVS) and Ability Enhancement Course (AEC), enabling students to explore subjects beyond their core discipline during their undergraduate studies. Students have the option for multiple entry and exits during undergraduate programmes as per the NEP 2020. The Centre for Research (CFR), conducts interdisciplinary and multidisciplinary internship programs engaging students from diverse fields in thematic explorations each year and through the annual interdisciplinary academic fest, Avgaahan. The college also encourages collaborations between departments through jointly organized seminars, conferences, and workshops. Maitreyi College has a wide range of academic and creative publications, including the international peer-reviewed, open access and multidisciplinary e-journal, Vantage: Journal of Thematic Analysis, and the peer-reviewed e-research magazine, Samvedna, both having ISSN numbers and published biannually. The college magazine Maitreyi, has an ISBN. This publication highlights institutional achievements and student creativity. Additionally, nine newsletters and magazines by various departments and three others from the Entrepreneurship Cell, Placement Cell, and Photography Society enrich the publication landscape.</p>	
16. Academic bank of credits (ABC):	
Maitreyi College, being a constituent college of the University of	

Delhi, complies with the Academic Bank of Credit (ABC) protocols and regulations mandated by the University of Delhi. The college ensures that all first-year students enrolled in the NEP Programmes promptly upload their credits to the Academic Bank of Credit in accordance with notifications issued by the University.

17.Skill development:

The component of skill enhancement is now embedded in the UGCF curriculum as offered by the University of Delhi. So, every student has to study six SEC courses (Credit of each Course: 2). The college has also done mapping of various SEC courses (https://www.maitreyi.ac.in/aqar/aqar23-24/Part%20A%20/SEC_All%20departments_2024.pdf) and details are readily available on the college website (<https://www.maitreyi.ac.in/skill-centre/seccourses>) so that students can choose various skill courses over the period of three years and empower themselves with desired skills to improve their employability. Maitreyi College offers 50 SEC courses as offered by the University of Delhi. The college also offers a variety of non-credit short-term courses, remedial classes and bridge courses to enhance students' strengths and sharpen their entrepreneurship skills. The college established a Skill development centre Atharvan, with the seed money granted by the University of Delhi. Under this umbrella, there are many fully functional skill centres in the college like Haritika, and Srijan. The prompt functioning of these skill centres has resulted in the incubation of a few startups such as mushroom cultivation facility, Kasturi Herbals etc. in the first phase itself.

18.Appropriate integration of Indian Knowledge system (teaching in Indian Language, culture, using online course)

Encouraging holistic development of students that is deeply rooted in Indian Culture and ethos, it is very important to integrate Indian Knowledge System (IKS) in the curriculum, and is evident in the UGCF curriculum offered by the University of Delhi. The College offers 22 Indian languages as listed in the Eighth Schedule of the Constitution of India, under Ability Enhancement Course (AEC). Under this, students can study 2 Indian languages of their choice during their undergraduate program. The college has three linguistic departments - Hindi, Sanskrit and Punjabi, and to study other languages of their choice, students are allowed to go to other constituent colleges of University of Delhi under the Cluster College scheme. Through various Value Addition Courses (VAC), the knowledge about rich cultural heritage and practices are imparted to students. The students have to study four VAC courses (Credit of each course: 2) from the pool in the first and second year of their

undergraduate programs.

19.Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):Focus on Outcome based education (OBE):

The College offered LOCF and UGCF curriculum as curated by University of Delhi with a focus on learning outcome. For holistic development, focus is on enhancing the IKS, impart values and skills to students, and enhance their scientific acumen. This is very well reflected through the progression of students, which is regularly monitored by IQAC. During 2023-24, approximately 25% of students got placement opportunities, around 50% are pursuing higher education from national and international universities, and many are preparing for competitive examinations such as Union Public Service Commission (UPSC), banking and management courses.

20.Distance education/online education:

Being a constituent college of University of Delhi, Maitreyi College is successfully running the SOL (School of Open learning) centre of University of Delhi. The classes under the Personal Contact program (PCP) of SOL are conducted every Sunday and students from Delhi-NCR come for these classes. The college also conducts end-semester examinations for such students. The college is also running a non-collegiate centre for Non-Collegiate Women's Education Board (NCWEB), affiliated to University of Delhi for girls residing in Delhi only. The college is also offering short term Certificate Courses in online mode, curated by the faculty of various departments of the college. These courses are attended by students across India.

1.1.1 - The Institution ensures effective curriculum delivery through a well planned and documented process	
<p>Maitreyi College emphasizes modern pedagogical approaches in curriculum planning and implementation, focusing on interactive and experiential learning. Teaching methods go beyond traditional lectures, incorporating activities like presentations, quizzes, and group discussions to engage students. Technology plays a key role in the classroom, with ICT tools like projectors and smart boards enhancing the learning experience. The college's library offers extensive academic resources through e-books and e-journals via the N-LIST facility.</p> <p>The adoption of the National Education Policy (NEP) has introduced flexibility in the curriculum, allowing students to choose courses aligned with their interests and needs, including Ability Enhancement Compulsory Courses (AECC), Generic Electives (GE), Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC), and Value Addition Courses (VAC). In the 2023-24 academic year, 50 SEC and 20 VAC courses were offered. The cluster college movement enables students to explore</p>	

courses across different colleges, broadening their academic options.

The college also organizes programs like the Summer Internship Programme, Annual Research Programme, workshops, seminars, and educational trips. These initiatives aim to develop critical thinking, research skills, and entrepreneurial abilities, preparing students for academic and professional success with a focus on empowering women.

The college implements curriculum delivery, assessments and other pedagogical activities in a well-organized manner that aligns with university guidelines. All departments follow a consistent timetable for theory, practical classes and tutorials, ensuring students balance academics with co-curricular activities. The academic calendar of the college is aligned with the university's schedule. Formative assessments are conducted through regular class tests, assignments, quizzes, ICT-based presentations, and practical lab work. These assessments assess concept understanding, soft skills, critical thinking and hands-on knowledge. Lectures are followed by interactive sessions and discussions to encourage student engagement. Teachers assign regular assignments, e-assignments, and tests, which students submit as hard copies, soft copies, or PowerPoint presentations. These are carefully reviewed and graded by the faculty. Additionally, monthly updates systematically record student attendance on the college portal.

1.3 - Curriculum Enrichment

1.3.1 - Institution integrates crosscutting issues relevant to Professional Ethics, Gender, Human Values, Environment and Sustainability into the Curriculum

Maitreyi College has effectively integrated sustainability, gender sensitivity, human values and professional ethics into its academic and co-curricular framework, aligned with the NEP-prescribed curricular structure. The college promotes diverse areas of knowledge through discipline-specific core, elective, and skill-enhancement papers, including IT skills, management, visual communication, political leadership, and personal financial planning. Value-added courses on yoga, happiness and human values emphasize well-being and holistic education. Environment awareness is fostered through papers on sustainable ecotourism, Swachh Bharat policy and green belt development for smart cities. Gender sensitivity is incorporated through courses on gender and violence, women and politics in India, and reproductive health, complemented by active support from committees like the ICC, NSS, and Women's Development Cell. Experiential learning through different college societies and department led co-curricular activities further integrate expansive sets of issues more deeply into the curriculum and aid the development of curricular teaching in these aspects. These include departmental trips, workshops, seminars, orientation programs, conferences, debates, quizzes, essay writing competitions, poster-making competitions and film

screenings. Student-led start-ups like Prakriti's Nutribiome, Kasturi Herbals, and Chatraka's mushroom cultivation, along with Enactus' projects Misbah and Swarnim, reflect sustainability and inclusivity, showcasing the college's commitment to fostering responsible citizenship.

2.2 - Catering to Student Diversity

2.2.1 - The institution assesses the learning levels of the students and organizes special Programmes for advanced learners and slow learners

Maitreyi College is dedicated to the holistic development of all its students by assessing their learning levels and offering customized programs to meet their diverse academic needs. For advanced learners, the college provides platforms to organize and participate in creative pursuits such as painting, singing, dancing, and debating. These talents are showcased in inter-college and national competitions, bringing recognition to the institution. Students also engage in compiling and designing newsletters and magazines and participate in co-curricular activities like the National Service Scheme (NSS) and the National Cadet Corps (NCC) for well-rounded development. Mentor-Mentee groups further guide students, helping them channel their abilities into relevant societies and activities.

To build entrepreneurial skills, the Entrepreneurship Cell organizes initiatives like Dravya and Marketricks, offering insights into finance and market trends, complemented by internships and placement opportunities. Capacity-building courses in organic mushroom cultivation, aquarium management, and e-waste

recycling equip students with practical skills for start-ups. Maitreyi College, a premier knowledge center dedicated to women empowerment, provides comprehensive infrastructural support to foster an enriching learning environment. The college is equipped with Wi-Fi-enabled ICT classrooms, seminar halls, computer laboratories, laptops, printers, and a Wi-Fi-enabled hostel campus. To support differently-abled students, the college offers computers with NVDA or Hindi OCR software and Lex cameras integrated with JAWS and Kurzweil software, enhancing the accessibility and effectiveness of teaching and learning.

The college library boasts a vast collection of books and provides access to extensive e-resources through subscriptions to NLIST (over three crore e-books) and DELNET (over sixteen thousand e-journals), promoting digital literacy and research. Faculty members continually upgrade their skills through various e-learning platforms, actively participating in workshops and seminars focused on digital literacy.

Maitreyi College effectively integrates ICT tools beyond traditional classrooms to enrich student learning and engagement. Maitreyi College ensures a transparent and robust Internal Assessment (IA) and Continuous Assessment (CA) process, aligning with University of Delhi guidelines. Students are informed about IA/CA policies through the University website, college prospectus, and departmental orientation programs. Monthly student attendance records are uploaded on the college website, and issues related to attendance are addressed by the "Short of Attendance" committee. Attendance benefits are granted for medical reasons or participation in extracurricular activities, following University norms.

At the start of each semester, students are briefed on IA/CA evaluation methods, including assignments, presentations, projects, and tests. For Practical Skill Enhancement Courses (SEC) and Value-Added Courses (VAC), continuous assessment occurs in every class, emphasizing consistent evaluation over reliance on final exams. This approach ensures regular feedback and opportunities for improvement.

Assignments and tests are returned with constructive feedback, and students are encouraged to engage in teacher-student discussions to understand their strengths and areas for growth. Final IA marks are shared for student verification before being uploaded to the University portal. Grievances regarding IA can be addressed with faculty, the Grievance Committee, or the Principal's office. Notably, no IA grievances were reported in the 2023-2024 academic session.

The college has an effective system for addressing grievances related to internal assessments (IA/CA). At the semester's start, teachers provide a clear bifurcation of IA/CA marks and inform students well in advance about the internal examinations to ensure adequate preparation time. Assignments and tests are assessed carefully, returned with constructive feedback, and improvement tests are conducted upon request.

To support learning, teachers hold remedial classes or tutorials to clarify concepts. IA marks are uploaded on the college website at the end of the semester for transparency, and monthly attendance records are also shared online. If discrepancies arise, students can approach teachers for necessary corrections.

Attendance issues are managed by the 'Short of Attendance' Committee, which addresses related concerns at the semester's end. Additionally, a staff council 'Grievance Committee' addresses broader student grievances.

The college also has a robust mentor-mentee system, where each student is assigned a mentor to share concerns. Mentors actively assist mentees in resolving academic, personal, or administrative issues, fostering a supportive environment. These mechanisms collectively ensure that student concerns are addressed promptly and efficiently, promoting transparency and support.

INFRASTRUCTURE AND LEARNING RESOURCES

4.1 - Physical Facilities

4.1.1 - The Institution has adequate infrastructure and physical facilities for teaching- learning. viz., classrooms, laboratories, computing equipment etc.

Maitreyi College has the state-of-the-art infrastructure and the best of the physical facilities available for performing teaching-learning activities. More than 64 classrooms and learning spaces (including 50 lecture classrooms, 21 auditoria lecture classrooms, 16 well-equipped science laboratories, 5 computer laboratories, the Skill Enhancement Centre - ATHARVAN, zoology and botany museums, botanical and herbal gardens) are located in the three blocks of the 10-acre green campus - the Main Building, the Old Science Block, and the New Science Block. All the classrooms are equipped with ICT-enabled facilities such as projectors, smart screens or both.

Other vital infrastructure of the College includes a well-stocked two-storey College library, one 250-seater Seminar Hall, one 300-seater New Auditorium, one 120-seater Video Conferencing Room, one Committee Room, one 1200-capacity Amphitheatre, a 104-seater Girls' Hostel, Faculty Residence, a medical care centre, Girls Common Room, Students' Union Room, a cafeteria, a bank, a stationery-cum-book shop, and a photocopy shop.

The campus is PwD friendly with an Enabling Unit furnished with computers and printers and an advanced Kibo XS Device, a lift, ramps and tactile paving at the crucial points, and a QR Code based navigation system. The campus has an extensive network of high-speed Wi-Fi and LAN.

Maitreyi College has excellent facilities for sports, games, and cultural activities that supplement the classroom learning. The sports facilities include a Football Field, a Baseball and Softball Field, a Netball Court, a Volleyball Court, a Badminton Court, a Hockey Ground, and a 200-meter Athletic Grass Track. The campus has a Multipurpose Hall for indoor games like Judo, Wrestling, Powerlifting, Chess, and Yoga. It also has a Sports Gymnasium to maintain the fitness of the students. A few of the facilities such as the synthetic basketball court support para-athletics as well.

Cultural activities are of vital importance at Maitreyi College. A 1200-capacity Amphitheatre, one 300-seater New Auditorium, one 120-seater Video Conferencing Room, one 250-seater NSB Seminar Hall, and dedicated Societies Rooms meet the Co-Curricular needs of the students of over 40 Academic and Cultural Societies.

The annual productions of the different Cultural Societies are held under the supervision of College-appointed Instructors. The Cultural Societies have their own dedicated musical instruments

such as electronic tanpura, harmonium, mic, sound system, provided by the College, to practice and perform in the competitions held in and outside the institution ??with College-facilitated transportation.

4.2 - Library as a Learning Resource

The well-stocked two-storey state-of-the-art College library is fully automated with the Integrated Library Management System (ILMS) – SOUL 3.0.6 software, developed by INFLIBNET, that helps the users faster access the library resources, since the year 2010.

In addition, the library is also equipped with Radio Frequency Identification (RFID) Technology, for better user experience, accurate tracking and monitoring, and improved inventory management.

It possesses a collection of over 1 lakh books, and has subscriptions to 51 journals and magazines as well as 23 major national newspapers. The library also provides access to many e-books and e-journals through its N-List facility. It also has membership of DELNET services. The library users can also access the online databases subscribed by the Delhi University Library System (DULS) through the College network.

The screen reading software such as JAWS and Kurzweil and scanning and reading devices such as Lex Camera and Kibo Scanner are available for visually challenged students and faculty.

Among the other amenities of the library include subscription to plagiarism checker software DrillBit, two computer kiosks with Online Public Access Catalog (OPAC), and air-conditioned reading halls.

Maitreyi College recurrently upgrades and updates its IT facilities with the latest versions of the tools and applications. Continuing this practice, the classrooms have been equipped with projectors and Smart Whiteboards for better classroom learning experience and the five computer laboratories have the latest software such as R, Python, Octaves.

The library is integrated with the latest IT applications like ILMS - SOUL 3.0.6 software, RFID Technology, plagiarism checker DrillBit and Urkund, and OPAC and has screen reading IT facilities such as JAWS, Kurzweil, Lex Camera and Kibo Scanner, for the visually impaired students and faculty.

Among the recent upgradation of the IT facilities include purchase of hundreds of personal computers including All-in-One Computers with features like 'Read Aloud' PDF files, setting up a server room, subscription to Zoom, development of QR Code based navigation, integration of the campus with high-speed LAN and Wi-Fi, installation of CCTVs, connectivity to the National Knowledge Network of the Delhi University Computer Centre.

IT tools like Tally and applications like Public Finance Management System (PFMS) and College Management Information System/ERP are utilised by the Accounts and Administration Sections for payroll generation and managing the digital record of internal assessment and attendance of the students.

Maitreyi College has a coherent policy to maintain and upgrade its physical and academic facilities consistently and optimize them to the best potential of the institution. For this purpose, there are dedicated Staff Council Committees such as Maintenance Committee, Purchase Committee, Finance Committee, Computerisation Committee

to ensure that classrooms, laboratories, library, sports facilities, etc., are well maintained, recurrently upgraded, and fully utilized. Furthermore, annual maintenance contracts are awarded to firms for the maintenance and upgradation of laboratories, website, computers, and other equipment and devices such as Wi-Fi, CCTV, fire safety, lift.

The Cultural Committees under the aegis of Students' Union ensure the effective utilisation of the co-curricular and extra-curricular facilities and the Sports Committee oversees the best utilisation of the sports facilities. The College Hostel is managed by the Hostel Committee and the Time Table Committee ensures the classrooms are optimally utilised.

Other bodies such as the Health and Hygiene Committee, Canteen Committee, make policy decisions concerning the well-being of the college community and cafeteria, respectively and the housekeeping staff under the supervision of the caretaker ensures the upkeep of the campus premises. Maitreyi College fosters an inclusive culture that empowers women students, integrating academic excellence with personal and professional growth. Through a dynamic blend of curricular, co-curricular, and extracurricular activities, institution promotes critical thinking, creativity, and self-expression.

A hallmark of the college is its bottom-up governance model, ensuring active participation of all stakeholders, including students, in shaping its environment. As the third tier of governance, students play a pivotal role in decision-making processes, particularly those concerning extracurricular and co-

curricular initiatives, ensuring their voices are integral to institutional planning.

Student representatives, including elected office bearers from departmental associations and Students' Union, collaborate with faculty members and 42 staff council committees. These include the Internal Committee (IC), Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC), NSS, NCC, Enactus, Women Development Cell, Placement Cell, and Anti-Ragging Committee among others. Maitreyi College aims to sustain a holistic learning environment, where research and innovation are central to all endeavours.

Avgaahan, the multidisciplinary academic festival, fosters collaboration across departments, hosting activities like debates, quizzes, coding competitions, and creative writing contests. These events are held in a hybrid format, witnessed participation from 1,688 students from across the country participating in 2024.

The Centre for Research promotes enquiry and innovation through the Summer Internship Program, Annual Research Programme, and Vocal for Local projects. It also publishes Vantage: Journal of Thematic Analysis and hosts the Annual International Conference Equinox. In 2024, the conference had 118 participants from India and abroad, along with 11 educational excursions by ACPG,

enriching experiential learning.

The Internal Committee publishes Samvedna, a peer-reviewed e-research magazine addressing gender and societal issues. Research at the college thrives with 17 PhD scholars supervised by 14 faculty members. The college has 1 patent registered in India this academic session, bringing the total to 11 national and international patents.

Short-term Courses, offers skill-based courses in a hybrid format, equipping students with practical skills in ICT, legal literacy, foreign languages, entrepreneurship, and international relations, among others bridging the gap between theory and real-world application

The organizational structure at Maitreyi College is designed to ensure effective governance and smooth functioning of the institution.

The Governing Body comprises a Chairperson, Treasurer, Principal as Member Secretary, two university representatives, two teacher representatives, one non-teaching staff, and ten external members.

The Principal is assisted by the Staff Council, Bursar, IQAC, Teachers-in-Charge, and Non-Teaching staff.

The Staff Council includes the Principal, permanent faculty, Librarian, and an elected Council Secretary.

The Bursar is responsible for overseeing internal finance and financial audits.

The IQAC (Internal Quality Assurance Cell) comprises the

Principal, a governing body representative, faculty representatives, two external members, an administrative representative, an accounting member, and a student member.

The Internal Committee (IC) is led by three senior faculty members, with three elected student representatives and an external member. The teachers-in-Charges work closely with the Principal to implement academic and extracurricular initiatives.

The Administration, which includes the Principal, Administrative Officer, Section Officers, senior P.A. to the Principal and other employees, handles various administrative duties.

The college has appointed a total of 89 permanent faculty members to ensure a smooth curriculum delivery. The appointments are made in accordance with the UGC guidelines adopted and implemented by the University of Delhi.

6.3 - Faculty Empowerment Strategies

6.3.1 - The institution has effective welfare measures for teaching and non- teaching staff

Maitreyi College provides research and travel grants for the teaching and the non-teaching staff. The staff has access to various leaves during their service period and are provided with National Pension System, medical reimbursements, LTC/HTC, children's education allowance, ward quota scheme and retirement benefits as per university regulations.

Infrastructural facilities and medical facilities including counselling services are available for the staff. Medical facilities are not only confined to permanent members but are also extended to their family members as per the CGHS rules.

Webinars and seminars on health and hygiene, Cyber Security, a One Week 'Interdisciplinary Training Programme for Laboratory Staff' were organized for the overall awareness of the staff.

ICT facilities are provided to facilitate online teaching-learning. Library facilities are extended online through N-LIST, DELNET, and INFLIBNET. Maitreyi College puts emphasis on a state-of-the art infrastructure for its specially-abled staff. This includes a reader-writer bank, Lax Camera with JAWS software in the library and other facilities in the Enabling Unit.

The college also provides Uniform allowance for Group D employees.

The college Sports Day facilitates bonding between teaching and non-teaching staff. They use sports facilities not only for intra- and inter-college sports competitions but also for everyday recreation.

6.3.5 - Institutions Performance Appraisal System for teaching and non- teaching staff

The Performance Appraisal System for teaching staff follows the UGC prescribed Merit Promotion Scheme (MPS) 1998, Career Advancement Scheme (CAS) 2010 and CAS 2018 guidelines wherein every faculty member fills the APAR (Annual Performance Appraisal Report) under the PBAS (Performance Based Appraisal Scheme). The APAR is significant for career advancement of the teachers especially when they apply for promotions.

The Internal Quality Assurance Committee (IQAC) of the college plays a significant role in the screening process for the promotions of the teaching faculty. For the non-teaching staff too, the college follows the norms outlined by UGC.

In the science departments, the teachers-in-charge contribute significantly to the evaluation process of the staff members. Once the process is completed by the assessing officer, the APAR is sent to the principal's office where it is evaluated for the annual increment of the non-teaching staff.

For promotions, the reports of the last three or five years are considered when a staff member is due for promotion. This entire process is confidential. So far, no reports have been found to be unsatisfactory by the committee.

The achievements of the non-teaching staff are also documented in the annual report of the college.

The college employs a clear and efficient approach to financial management and resource mobilization. This ensures fiscal responsibility and aligns the institution with its strategic objectives. The auditing procedure carried out by the institution is elucidated as below:

The internal audits are conducted annually by statutory auditors, with financial statements prepared by a Chartered Accountant. These are reviewed by the Section Officer, Bursar, Principal, and Governing Body before being submitted to the Director, Higher Education. All financial statements, namely, Balance Sheets, Income statements, Cash flow statements and Annual Salary statements are carefully vetted by the University Grants Commission. Records of all financial transactions are kept by the institution, which are produced when needed to address questions raised by the auditors. Every internal audit report in the given year was deemed adequate.

The institution undergoes external audits by the Directorate of Audit and the Office of the Director-General of Audit. The audit examines financial accounts and any objections or recommendations are addressed by the Accounts Department, with a final approval by the Principal. The recent CAG audit (2021) commended the institution's accounting system and found the accounts satisfactory.

6.4.3 - Institutional strategies for mobilization of funds and the optimal utilization of resources

Maitreyi College receives 95% of its funding from the UGC and 5% from the Government of NCT Delhi. Participation in the Central Evaluation Centre (CEC), space rentals for a bank, photocopy shop, stationery, and canteen, as well as other campus cultural events, generate some of the funds.

Funding is also provided by the registration fees for workshops and seminars in college, and one-time Alumni Association membership payments. The library gives departments money to buy reference material. The purchase committee uses a GeM site, also known as the Central Public Procurement site, to make the purchases. After receiving requests from the relevant departments and people, the principal authorises and approves all college expenses. For any necessary action, a statement of accounting and expenditure is sent to the Section Officer (Accounts) and the Bursar. Research projects, college infrastructure upkeep and repairs, instructional travel, administrative costs, and routine expenses like phone, water, and power are all funded with the

money. Recurring grants are used to pay retirement pension, and salary benefits. The college uses its tuition money as well as donations from philanthropists and the retired staff to fund student freeships and startup projects.

Through the combination of ICT and creative efforts, the Internal Quality Assurance Cell (IQAC) has been instrumental in institutionalising several methods that improve academic and administrative quality.

Multidisciplinary academic events such as Avgaahan, the interdisciplinary academic fest, webinars on digital health awareness, tests on Cyber Security Awareness, and online short courses short-term courses are some examples of ICT-enabled activities.

Additionally, the college website comprises department-specific and college publications, e-magazines, and e-newsletters such as The Chronicle (Placement Cell), Udyami (E-cell), Neeti (Economics), Vantage, and others that involve the use of ICT in their processes of production.

In addition, the college provides a free 240-hour ICT-DXC course on Banking, Insurance, and Management Skills and a 30-hour Certificate Course on "ICT Tools & Applications" to inculcate technically proficiency.

The formation of the Advisory Committee for Professional Grooming (ACPG), a staff council committee as an IQAC initiative, that manages important programs like Summer Internship Program (SIP) and Annual Research programme (ARP), along with Centre for Research (CFR), is another institutionalised practice. Together they host workshops for mentors and students, and organise Avlokan for project presentations. To promote holistic growth, they

organise departmental educational visits and marquee events like Equinox - the Annual International Conference.

Experiential learning is a significant aspect of the pedagogical update encouraged by the IQAC. Hosting webinars, presentations by renowned scholars and experts, and workshops are important endeavours that have significantly increased in both scope and impact. National and international speakers enrich academic and professional endeavours, while the use of ICT tools in classrooms facilitate a dynamic and inclusive educational experience.

The second reform involves facilitating industry exposure to students. Horizon, the college Placement Cell offers internships and job opportunities through the job fair Envision fair.

IQAC in collaboration with various other societies like Enabling Unit, NSS, and E-Cell and clubs in college works towards fostering social responsibility amongst students.

Innovative outreach initiatives including startup bazaars, online Initiatives such as yoga classes, blood donation camps, Nasha Mukti Abhiyan, free dental exams, awareness campaigns, among others enhance experiential learning.

IQAC has a robust feedback mechanism that involves student feedback at the end of each academic term and after events. IQAC conducts regular meetings between the Principal and all its members to discuss new initiatives and review existing ones.

7.1.1 - Measures initiated by the Institution for the promotion of gender equity during the year

Maitreyi College is committed to promoting gender equity and fostering a supportive environment for women through a range of curricular and co-curricular initiatives emphasizing gender sensitivity and inclusivity. The Women Development Cell and Internal Committee (IC) regularly organize seminars, workshops, and awareness programs addressing women's rights, self-defense, and gender sensitivity. Initiatives like Enactus, the entrepreneurship cell, and projects such as Misbah and Swarnim empower marginalized women with entrepreneurial skills, enabling

sustainable livelihoods.

To ensure student safety, IC addresses complaints related to gender-based harassment, while the Anti-Ragging and Discipline Committees maintain discipline and safety during events. The Sports Department also conducts self-defense training programs, equipping students to face challenging situations.

The college undertakes outreach efforts, including the Unnat Bharat Abhiyan and Sugamya Bharat Abhiyan, encouraging students to engage in community welfare and inclusivity projects. Safety measures include mandatory ID cards, deployment of security guards (including female guards), police patrol vehicles stationed outside the campus, and 80 CCTV cameras for monitoring. The hostel accommodates 102 students, ensuring a safe living environment.

Initiatives like Google-mapped classrooms, QR code navigation, and the UniWay Navigation System provide voice-guided directions, benefiting visually impaired users. These efforts underscore Maitreyi College's dedication to gender equity, and women empowerment.

Maitreyi College is dedicated to sustainability and manages degradable and non-degradable waste effectively through the principles of reduce, reuse, and recycle. The campus maintains a 'Plastic-Free' status, banning single-use plastics and promoting eco-friendly practices. Initiatives like the Swachhata Hi Seva 2023 campaign involved cleaning drives, plastic collection, and recycling, fostering environmental consciousness. Plastic bottles are creatively reused as planters to enhance campus aesthetics.

Solid waste is segregated at the source using color-coded bins. Garden waste is transformed into nutrient-rich manure through natural aerial oxidation, while dried branches support plant growth. The canteen uses steel and biodegradable crockery, and its biodegradable waste is composted under Project Urvara to produce manure for revenue generation. Non-degradable waste is managed with electric incinerators installed in the hostel and art block for efficient disposal.

Biomedical waste is handled as per the standard procedures as adopted by Delhi University. Microscale techniques and green chemistry principles are used to reduce hazardous chemical waste. Chemicals like phenol are recycled and reused after distillation. E-waste is responsibly managed through certified vendors, and used paper is recycled. Rejected water from RO plant is reused for toilet flushing, and proper drainage systems handle wastewater, while sensor-based taps minimize water wastage.

Maitreyi College fosters an inclusive environment, embracing cultural, regional, linguistic, and socioeconomic diversity. The institution exemplifies "Unity in Diversity," welcoming students from all backgrounds. North Indian students enjoy South Indian folk dances, while South Indian students relish North Indian

delicacies at the college canteen. The college celebrates various religious festivals, honors the legacies of luminaries like Dr. Bhimrao Ambedkar and Srinivasa Ramanujan, and recognizes student achievements in inter-college and inter-university competitions, where societies have won 126 trophies.

Cultural exchange is enriched through initiatives like the Fine Arts Society's Warli art workshop for Australian and New Zealand exchange students during the annual festival. Academic and psychological support is provided through mentor-mentee groups and remedial classes. Scholarships, fee reductions, and free-ships ensure financial challenges don't hinder education, benefiting 582 students this year.

Under the NEP 2024 framework, the college's skill center, Atharvan, received INR 8 lakhs seed fund. The college won the Value-Based Academic Achievement Award 2024. Accessibility initiatives include the Uniway App with the Sugmaya Maitreyi feature, supporting visually impaired students. Environmental efforts, including workshops, plantation drives, and eco-friendly practices, earned the 2023 National Environmental Education and Awareness Award. Maitreyi College remains committed to fostering inclusivity, sustainability, and holistic student development.

Eco-Consciousness and Skill Development: Pathway to Eco-Entrepreneurship

The college integrates eco-consciousness with skill-building through initiatives like banning single-use plastic, switching to LEDs and solar lights, implementing rainwater harvesting, and conducting Green and Energy Audits. The campus, with 296 trees and diverse flora, fosters a green environment, supported by the Garden Committee. Recognized with the 2023 National Environmental Education and Awareness Award, the college also promotes eco-entrepreneurship through projects Kasturi Herbals (herbal products), Gulistan (campus resources), and Chatraka (mushroom cultivation), with the first two generating ₹45K each. The Atharvan Skill Centre, funded with ₹8 lakhs, enhances employability through hands-on training.

Research and Innovation: Cultivating Future Scholars

The Centre for Research (CFR) and Advisory Committee for Professional Grooming (ACPG) strengthen the research culture among students and faculty. The Summer Internship Program (SIP) in 2023-24 supported 30 projects involving 58 faculty and 108 students, with outstanding work presented at Avlokan 2023. The Annual Research Programme (ARP) completed three projects and approved six more for 2024. Initiatives like the Vocal for Local program, Vantage journal, and the Equinox Conference promotes multidisciplinary research and societal contributions. These practices exemplify Maitreyi College's commitment to sustainability, innovation, and research-driven education, empowering students for future challenges.

Our institution fosters self-reliance and research skills within a gender-sensitive academic and cultural environment, focusing on equal opportunities for all students, including those with disabilities and special needs.

The Meraki Entrepreneurship Cell (E-Cell) at Maitreyi encourages students to transform ideas into real-world solutions, nurturing innovation and autonomy. Initiatives like Enactus Misbah and Enactus Swarnin empower women by creating employment opportunities and supporting sustainable businesses. The E-Cell also supports students in participating in start-up bazaars, providing valuable leadership and organizational experience.

In a notable achievement, the start-up Riding Rangers, founded by a Maitreyi alumna, secured a ₹10 lakh investment for 2% equity from Udhmodya, endorsed by the Vice Chancellor of Delhi University.

The StayMentor Initiative by Meraki E-Cell generated ₹3 lakh revenue and ₹1.85 lakh profit while empowering seven women with internships, fostering financial independence and professional growth. This initiative empowered seven young women with internships, fostering both financial independence and professional growth.

Our commitment to inclusivity extends beyond campus through student volunteer participation in events like Divya Utsav and the Purple Fest, promoting accessibility for all.
